

# When is the last time you...

Changed the needle on your machine?

Put in a new rotary blade?

Wiped off your cutting mat?

Cleaned your iron?

Oiled your machine (if your manufacturer recommends this)?

Cleaned out your bobbin case and surrounding housing?

Had your machine serviced?

Inventoried your consumable supplies so you'll know what you need if you see a sale (needles, bobbin cases, thread of a much used color, rotary blades, starch, a favorite cleaner, etc.)?

If you want to be really on top of things, print this list and jot down the date as you do each of these items.

These are all things we don't think to do until we are frustrated stitching and have to stop to do them... and once done, we often think "why didn't I do that sooner"?

Now would be sooner.

















Having three members bring collage quilts fascinated the viewers and inspired a program possibility! Barb Linares shared that she has a contact who teaches the Laura Heine collage method and offered to research bringing it as a future workshop. Look for more information at a future guild meeting.

What is a "collage quilt"? We often think of collage as being done with paper and paint. The same process can be used to create a collage style quilt. Motifs or shapes are cut from a variety of fabrics and combined with other materials, then layered onto a fabric base to create a picture or design. The materials in the collage can be fused, glued or stitched in place as well as painted or embellished with a variety of different mixed media. Each quilt artist has a set of technique that works well for them. The collage style can be used on its own to create an entire quilt, or become an element in a larger overall design.



## Disappearing Nine Patch Program (program facilitated by Chris Summers)

It may seem like sewing a quilt block just to cut it all up again is a little crazy. But taking a simple block, making a few cuts, rearranging the pieces, and sewing it back together can create complex and interesting patterns far more easily than stitching together lots of small pieces. Who doesn't like a time-saver that expands their creativity and reduces fabric-waste? That's just what the "Disappearing Block" technique can do!

Chris Summers presented a program, complete with example blocks (shown below) to introduce the technique to the guild, and remind those of us who have seen it what we might be missing ut on if we haven't used it in awhile. The concept is simple. Sew a basic block, sub-cut it, flip some or all of the sub-cut pieces to create a new block layout, then resew. Viola! A whole new block, and often one that creates a repeating pattern that can join together to make a larger scale motif when combined in a whole quilt. Hopefully we will see some future completed projects during Showed and Told as guild members are inspired by this technique.

The green pinwheel block was sliced into a nine patch and then the new pieces were flipped about to make a whole new pinwheel inside a church dash block!



The purple nine patch block was subcut and flipped.
Placing colors in different patterns on the nine patch can create unique designs.



# **Four Flowers**


12" finished quilt block

## Homemade Hot Fudge Sauce (Becky Coons—Christy Yates Mom)

1 stick butter

3/4 cup semi-sweet chocolate chips

1 can evaporated milk

2 cups powdered sugar

1 tsp vanilla

Melt 1 stick butter over low heat.

Add 1 can evaporated milk and 2 cups powdered sugar, stirring to combine.

Bring to a boil.

Cook 7-8 minutes at a boil, until rich and thick, stirring constantly.

Remove from heat and add 1 tsp vanilla.

Can be stored on countertop in well sealed container if used within 2-3 days, or in refrigerator.

Tip — Be sure to reheat slowly or sauce will "break" and become grainy. If you microwave, it's best to do 30 seconds at a time and stir between rather than do a minute or more at once.

This is a family tradition served with homemade ice cream, but I enjoy it best the next day... not reheated but spooned in all its fudgy goodness right onto a fresh banana!
